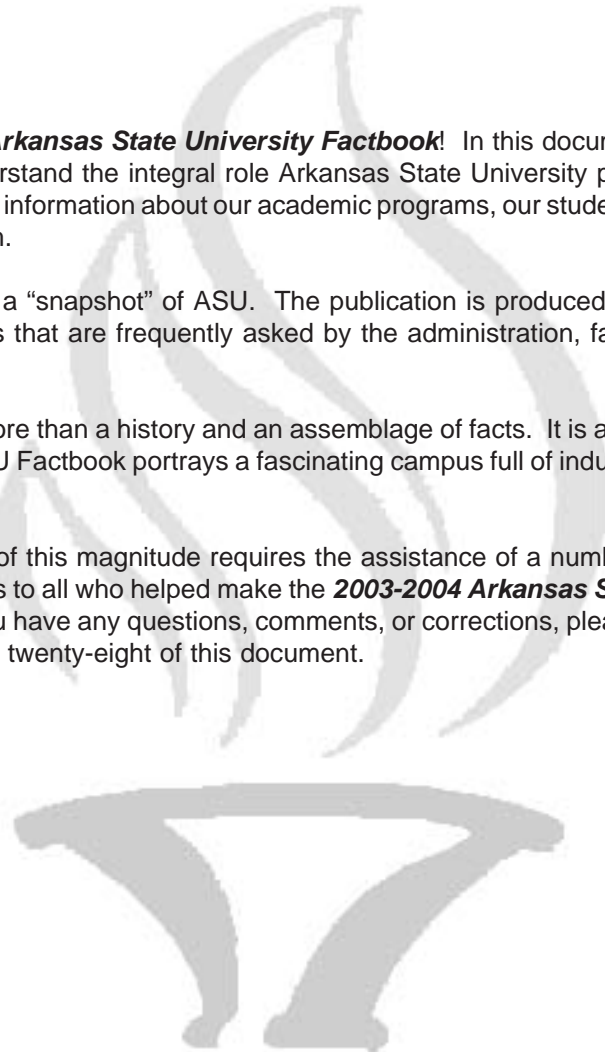

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Mission: *To serve the people of the State of Arkansas by providing management and control of Arkansas State University campuses in Jonesboro, Beebe, Newport, Mountain Home, and Heber Springs; degree centers of the university at sites in Blytheville, Forrest City, and West Memphis; and other academic programs throughout the state.*

The Trustees of Arkansas State University serve as a board of management and control. In this capacity, the Trustees hire the Arkansas State University president, approve the curriculum of the institution, annually approve an operating budget, establish policies for the efficient operation of the institution, and approve those matters which require participation of the governing board of the university. Trustees' duties include: appointing, supporting, and assessing the performance of the president; maintaining the clarity of the mission of Arkansas State University; approving long-range plans; approving the educational program; ensuring the well-being of the students, faculty, and staff; ensuring strong financial management; approving significant faculty and staff appointments and dismissals; ensuring adequate resources for quality programs; preserving institutional autonomy; interpreting the campus to the community; and interpreting the needs of society to the campus.

The governor of Arkansas appoints members of the Board of Trustees for a period of five years. The Senate of the General Assembly must confirm each appointment.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Mission: *To strive to set a standard of service in creating a caring campus environment in which all members of the university community are valued for the contributions they make in furthering the mission of the university.*

The President of Arkansas State University is the chief executive officer of the university system and the Jonesboro campus. The president is appointed by the Board of Trustees and is directly responsible to the Board of Trustees for the conduct of the institution, the development of institutional goals, the formulation of policies, and the overall well-being of the university.

The President's Office has established its values as integrity, dedication, excellence, cooperation, and a collegial work place.

Strategies to fulfill the President's Office mission include: *Providing personal assistance to every person who contacts the office. Treating each person contacted with respect and as a unique individual. Reflecting pride in who we are and what we do.*

The Arkansas State University System includes campuses in Jonesboro (Craighead County), Beebe (White County), Mountain Home (Baxter County), Newport (Jackson County), and the Technical Center at Marked Tree (Poinsett County). The Jonesboro campus offers degrees at the doctoral, specialist, master's, bachelor's, and associate levels through ten colleges. The Beebe, Mountain Home, and Newport campuses offer associate degrees with bachelor's degrees being offered through ASU - Jonesboro. ASU - Jonesboro offers bachelor's degree programs and upper level courses through institutions in Blytheville, Forrest City, and West Memphis; and associate's degrees through the ASU Technical Center. ASU also has sites in Heber Springs (Clebourn County), Paragould (Greene County), and Searcy (White County).

Arkansas State University - Jonesboro Mission Statement:
We pursue and share knowledge within a caring community that prepares students in challenging and diverse ways to become more productive global citizens.

ASU-Jonesboro is the second largest institution of higher education in the state. The arts and drama departments and the historical museum on campus provide a cultural background for the city of Jonesboro. Located in Northeast Arkansas, Jonesboro is the trade, cultural, and medical center for a market area of 500,000 people.

HISTORY

Arkansas State University was established in 1909 as a state agriculture school. The institution opened as a vocational high school in 1910 and changed to State Agricultural and Mechanical College in 1925. Authority to extend the curriculum, offer senior college work, and grant degrees was given to the institution by the legislature in 1925. Senior college work was initiated in 1930, and the first bachelor's degrees were granted in 1931. In 1933, the legislature changed the name of the college to Arkansas State College. Master's degree graduate programs were initiated in 1955 and Doctorate degree programs were added in 1999. Arkansas State College was granted university status in January 1967.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

Arkansas State University offers programs at the doctoral, specialist, master's, bachelor's, and associate degree levels through the colleges of Agriculture, Business, Communications, Education, Engineering, Fine Arts, Humanities & Social Sciences, Nursing & Health Professions, and Sciences & Mathematics; the University College; and the Center for Regional Programs. Additionally, ASU offers bachelor's degree programs at Mid-South Community College in West Memphis, ASU-Beebe, ASU-Mountain Home, and ASU-Newport; and offers associate degree programs at ASU Technical Center in Marked Tree.

Arkansas State University - Beebe Mission Statement:

Arkansas State University - Beebe is a public, open access, operationally separate campus of the Arkansas State University System. The major purpose of this institution is to provide high quality, affordable instruction and service programs. University transfer and technical programs are available to students at the associate degree and certificate levels. Instruction is also available at education centers at ASU - Searcy, Little Rock Air Force Base, and ASU - Heber Springs and through other off-campus locations. HISTORY

ASU - Beebe first opened in 1927 as Junior Agricultural School of Central Arkansas. In 1931, the institution was renamed the Junior Agriculture College of Central Arkansas. The college became a campus of Arkansas State College in 1955 and in 1967 changed to Arkansas State University - Beebe Campus. In 1985, the Arkansas State Technical Institute at ASU - Beebe was established.

Although the campus is one of only two public two-year colleges in Arkansas with dormitories, most of the students at ASU - Beebe are commuters. The campus is located thirty-one miles north of Little Rock and seventeen miles south of Searcy on U.S. Highways 67 and 167.

ASU - Beebe offers one-year certificates, two-year associate degrees, and a strong developmental program in English, math, and reading. An open admissions policy encourages the enrollment of both traditional-aged and non-traditional-aged students. ASU - Beebe recognizes the uniqueness of each student and provides support programs designed to assist students in determining and achieving their educational, personal, and occupational goals. The institution contributes to the economic development of Arkansas by providing comprehensive training and technical support for business and industry. PROGRAMS OF STUDY

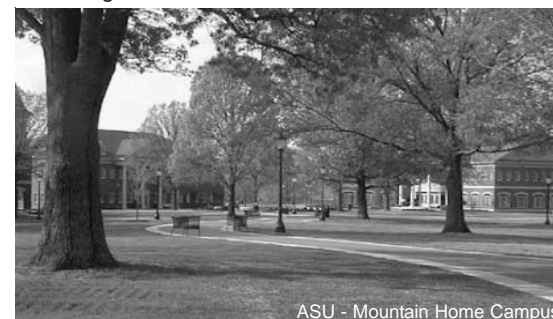

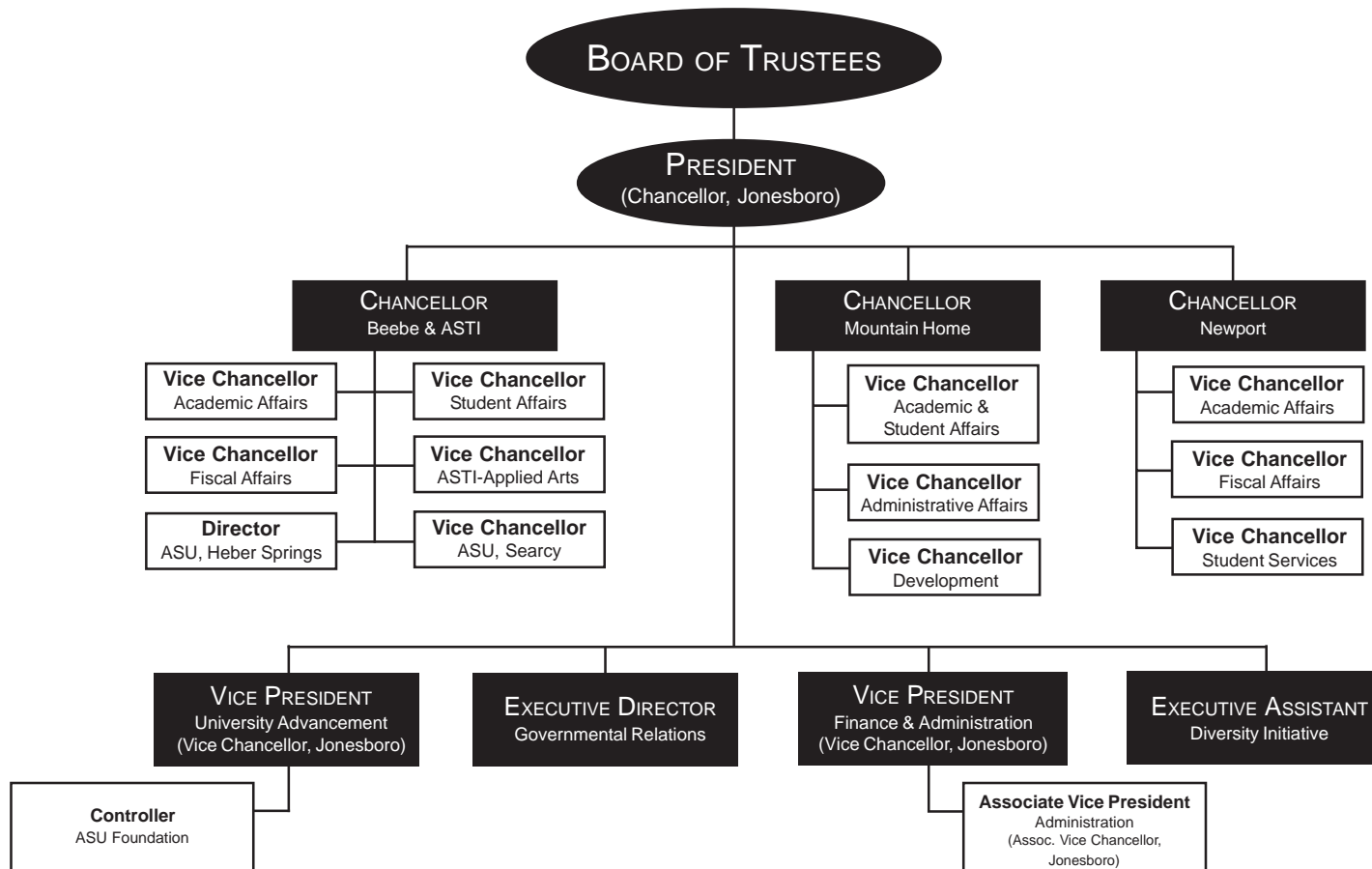

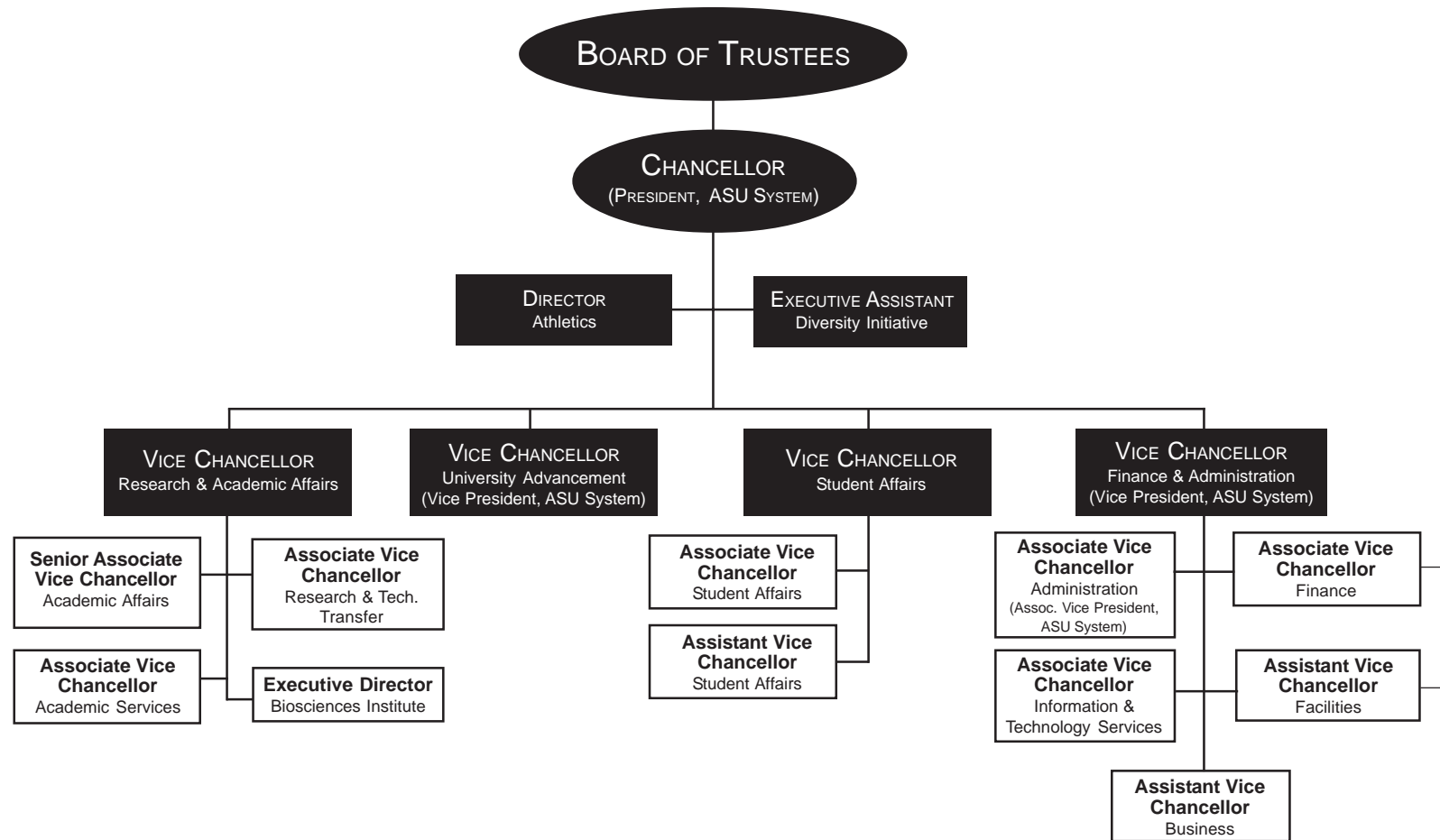
2003 - 2004 Organizational Structure



Arkansas State University - Jonesboro Campus

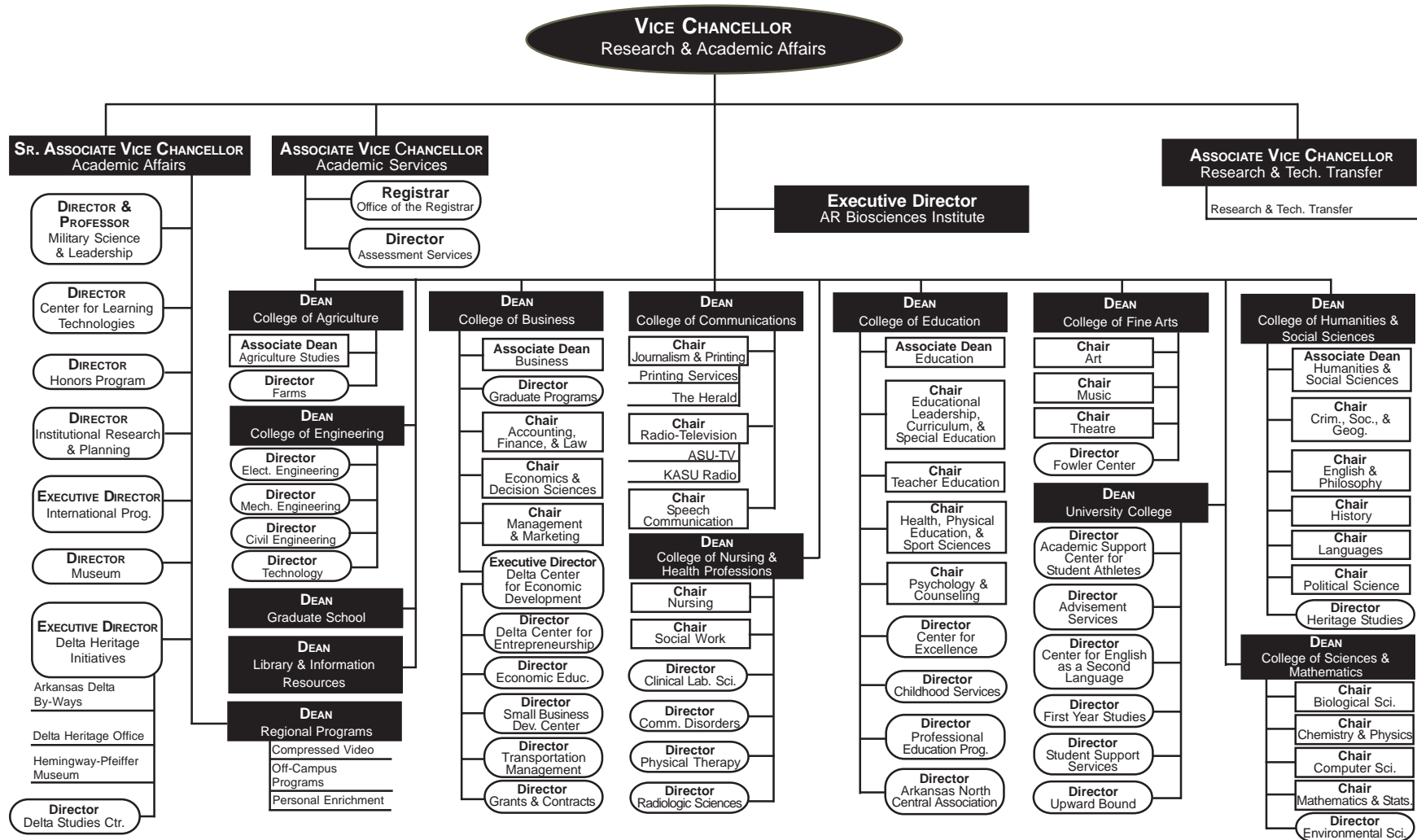


2003 - 2004 Organizational Structure

Military Science & Leadership Mission: *To commission the future officer leadership of the U.S. Army and motivate young people to become better citizens.*

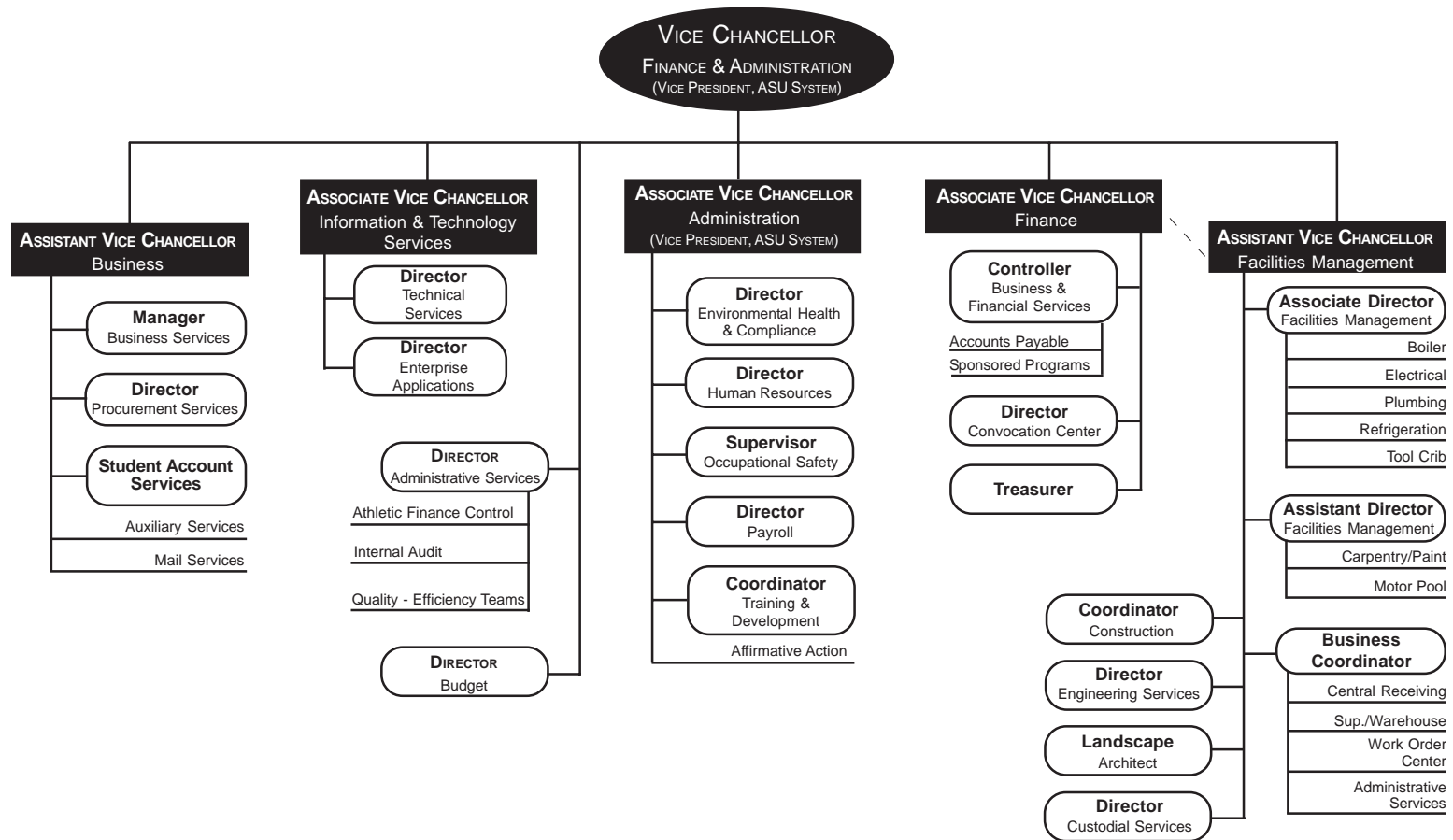

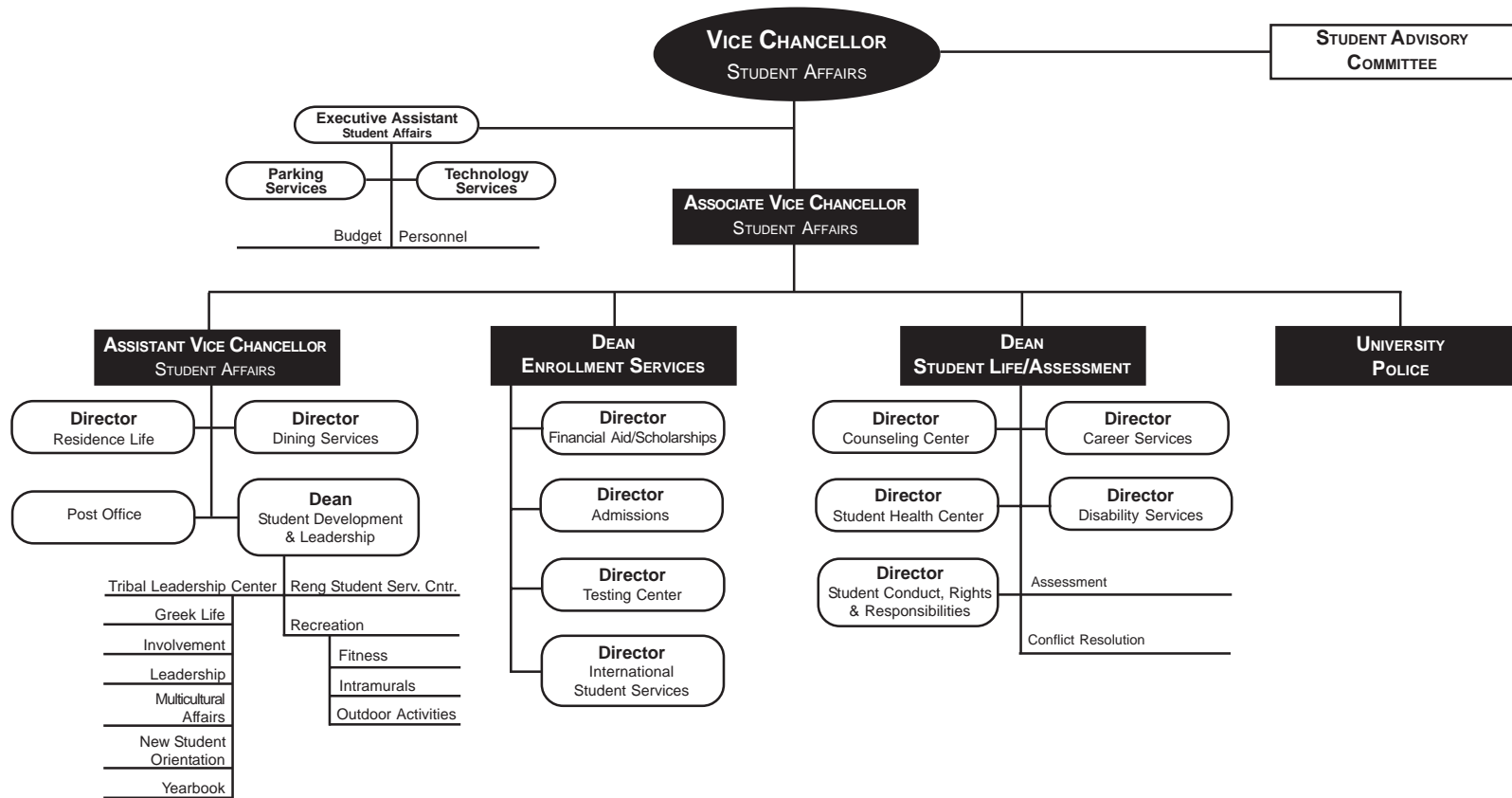

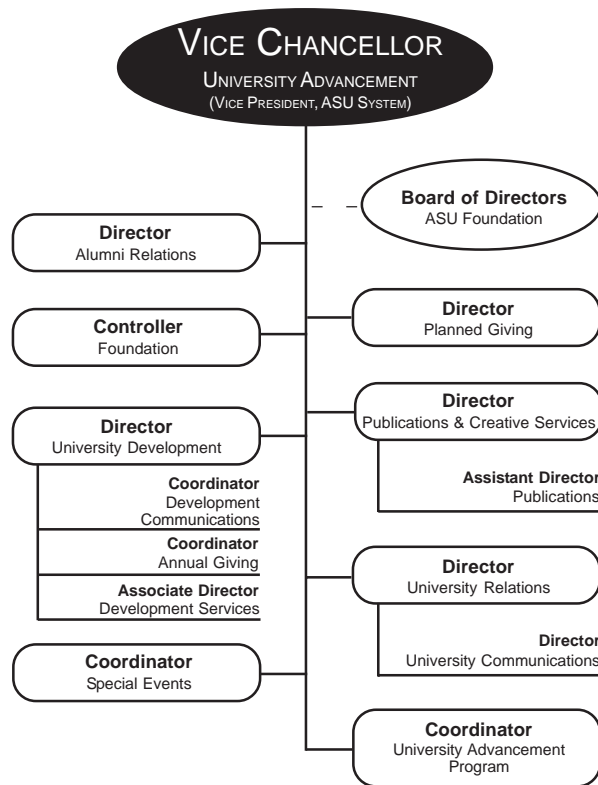

The SREB system for categorizing postsecondary education institutions is based upon a number of factors relevant to determining resource requirements. Differences in institutional size (number of degrees), role (types of degrees), breadth of program offerings (number of program areas in which degrees are granted), and comprehensiveness (distribution of degrees across program areas) are the factors upon which institutions are classified. Other factors relevant to determining resource requirements such as cost differences among programs or externally funded research are not taken into account in the SREB system.

CATEGORIES

Institutions are assigned to categories for a report year using the previous academic year's data on program completions. To keep the statistical comparison groups relatively stable over time and to assure that institutions change categories only when their measures on a criterion are relatively stable, institutions change categories when they meet the criterion for another category for the third consecutive year.

★**Four-Year 1:** Institutions awarding at least 100 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories (2-digit classification) with no more than 50 percent in any one category.

★**Four-Year 2:** Institutions awarding at least 30 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 5 CIP categories.

★**Four-Year 3:** Institutions awarding at least 100 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees with master's, education specialist, and post-master's degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories.

★**Four-Year 4:** Institutions awarding at least 30 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees with master's, education specialist, and post-master's degrees distributed among at least 5 CIP categories.

★**Four-Year 5:** Institutions awarding at least 30 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees.

★**Four-Year 6:** Institutions awarding less than 30 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees.

★**Two-Year 1:** Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of 5,000 or more; some certificates and diplomas may also be awarded.

★**Two-Year 2:** Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of between 2,000 and 4,999; some certificates and diplomas may also be awarded.

★**Two-Year 3:** Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of less than 2,000; some certificates and diplomas may also be awarded.

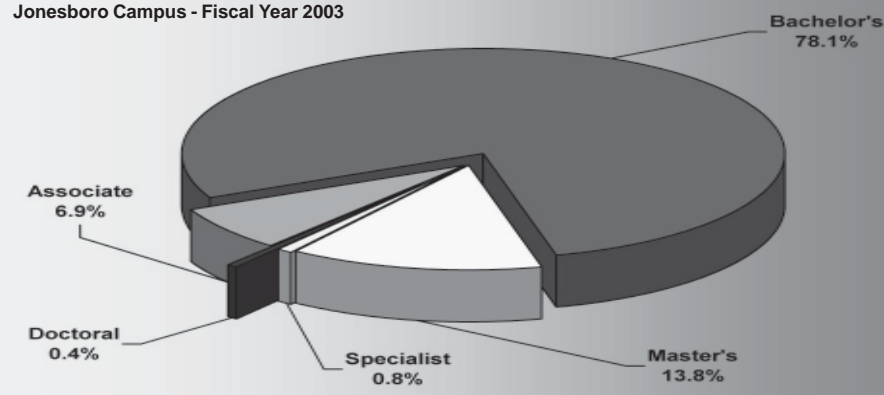

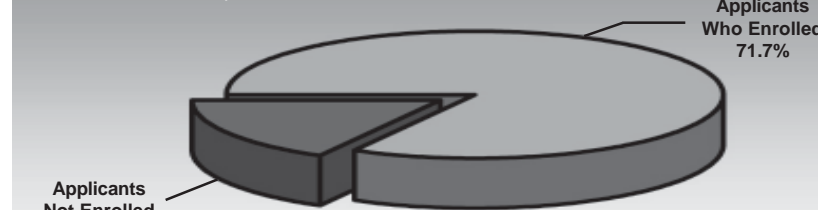

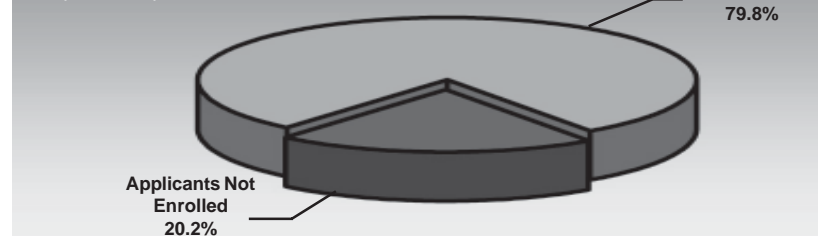
FIRST-TIME FRESHMAN APPLICANTS BY ENROLLMENT STATUS
Beebe Campus



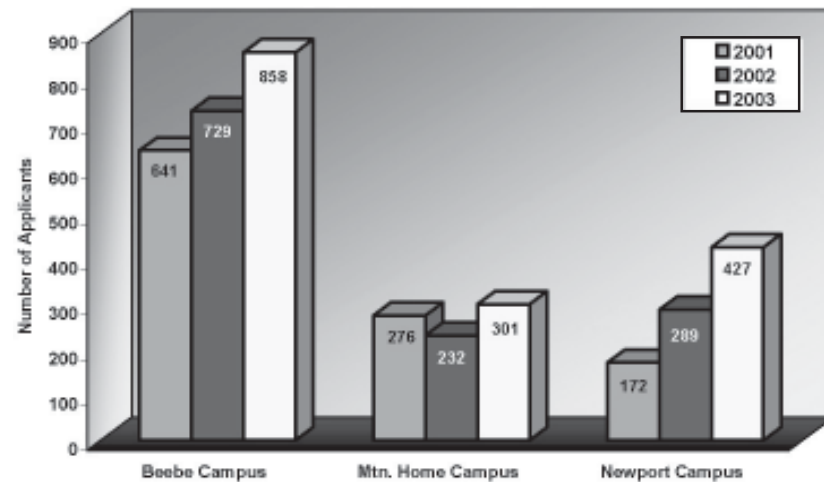
FIRST-TIME FRESHMAN APPLICANTS BY ENROLLMENT STATUS

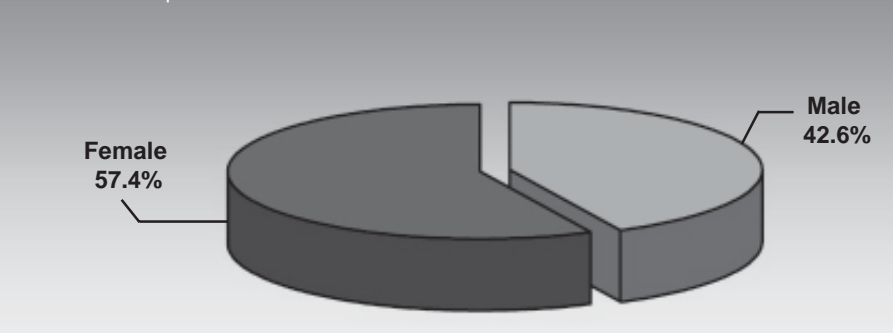

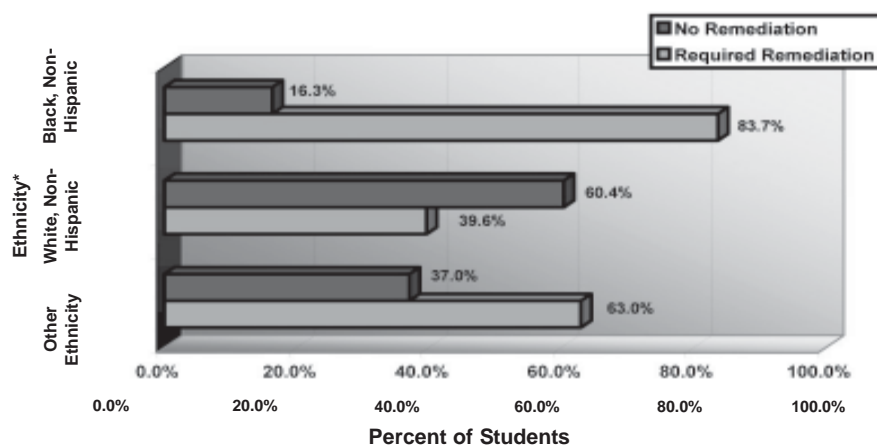

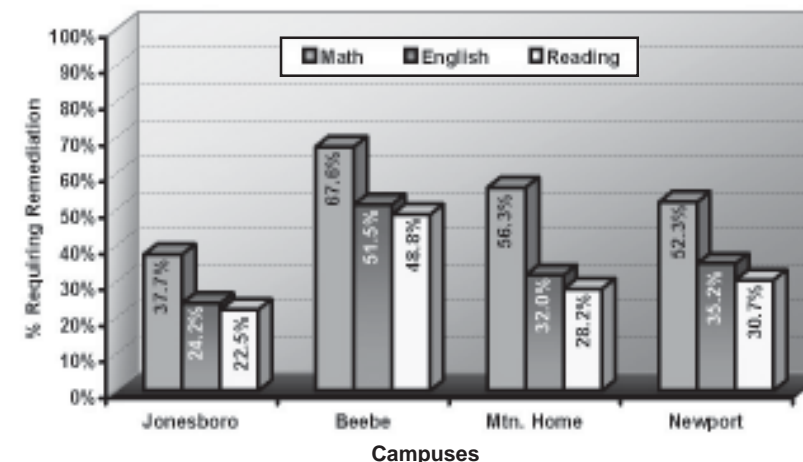
GENDER DISTRIBUTION OF FIRST-TIME FRESHMEN REQUIRING REMEDIATION

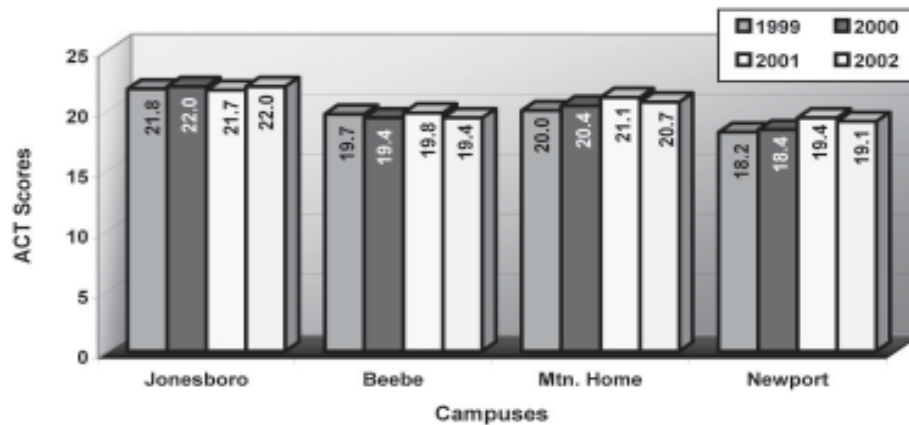

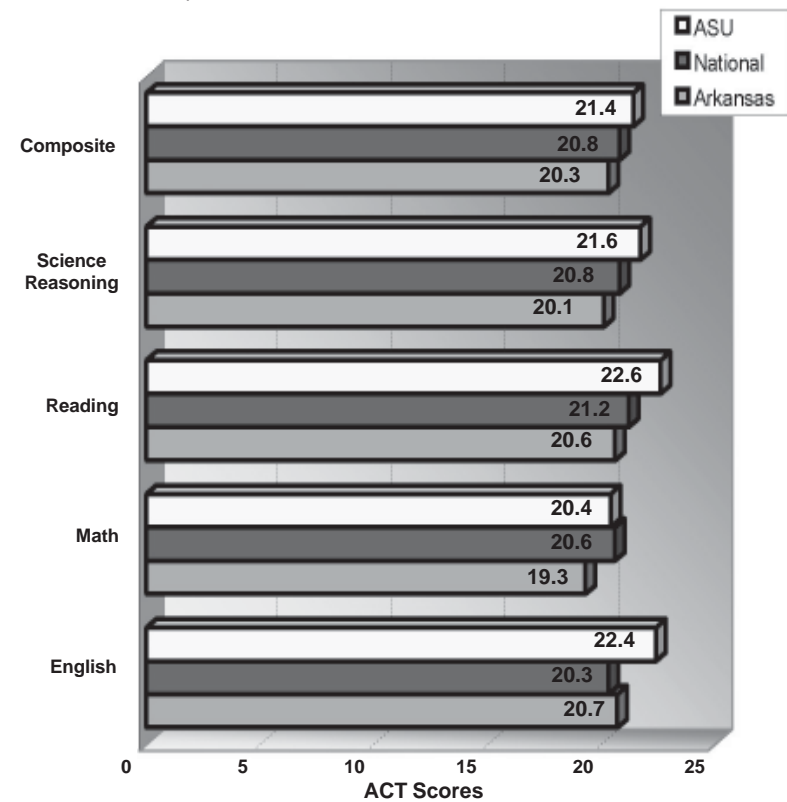
HISTORICAL AVERAGE ACT COMPOSITE SCORES

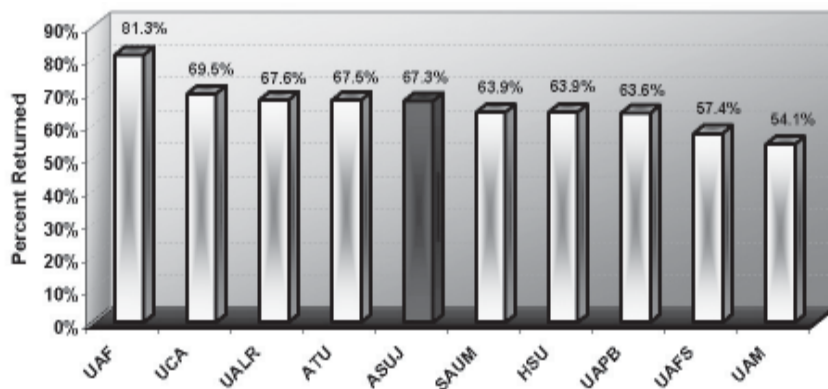

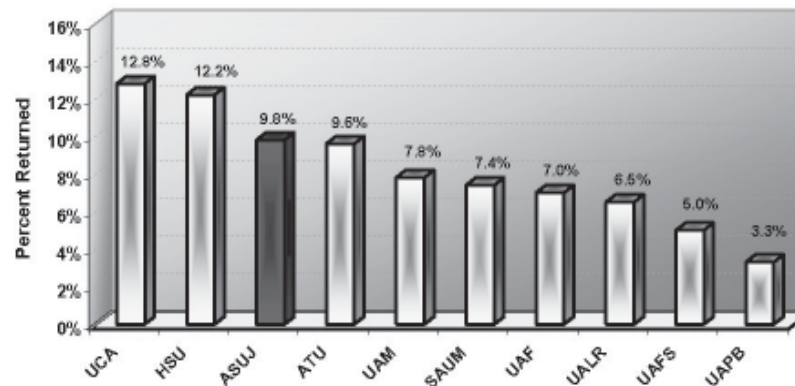

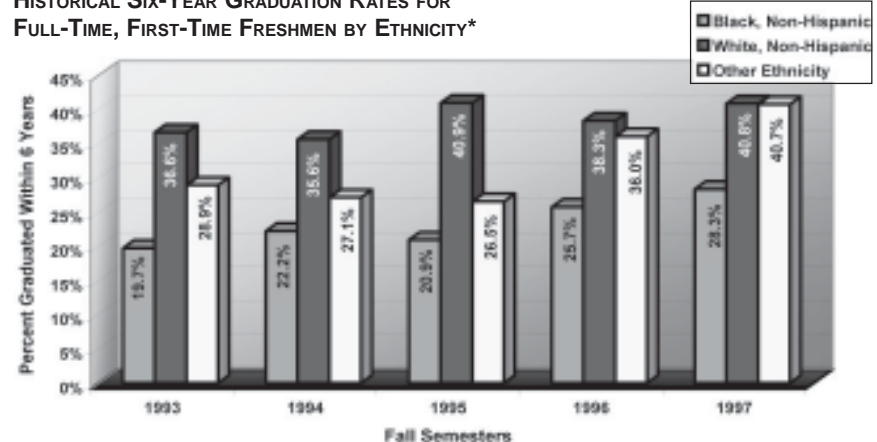

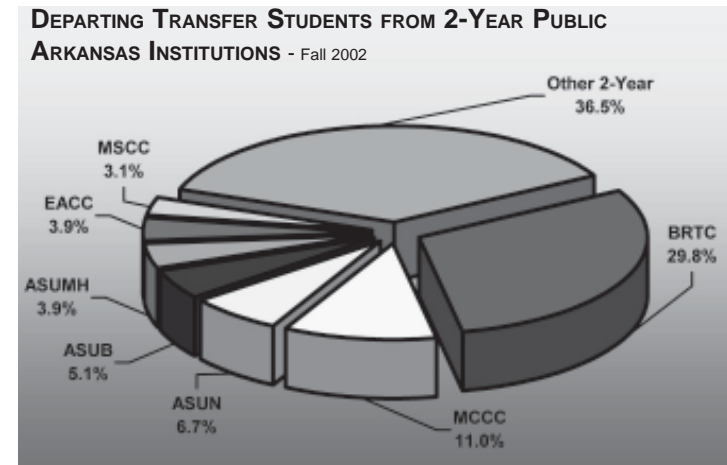

Arkansas State University fields 16 sports - seven for men and nine for women - in NCAA Division I, beginning in 2004. Arkansas State University's football program competes in NCAA Division I-A, the highest level for NCAA football.

CONFERENCE:

ASU belongs to the Sun Belt Conference in all sports.

TEAMS:

Football

- ★ASU hired Steve Roberts in 2002 to take over the football program. The Indians made a huge turnaround by finishing 6-7 overall. ASU played 13 games in less than 13 weeks. To reward their efforts, nine players were named to the All-Sun Belt team - five on the 1st team and four on the 2nd team.
- ★In 2003, ASU posted three consecutive 20,000-plus attendance figures in football.
- ★ASU enjoyed regional television coverage during the 2003 football season, appearing on ESPN Regional twice.
- ★The football Indians once again took their show to Central Arkansas when ASU hosted Louisiana-Monroe in Little Rock's War Memorial Stadium in early October. ASU took the Sun Belt Conference win.
- ★Five Indians were named to the All-Sun Belt Conference football team. Defensive linemen Corey Williams and Jon Bradley were selected to play in postseason all-star games.
- ★100 ASU Players have signed contracts with professional football leagues, and several former players and coaches have gone on to coach in the professional leagues.

Baseball

- ★ASU hired Keith Kessinger to coach the baseball Indians in the summer of 2002. Kessinger is the son of the legendary Don Kessinger.
- ★ASU's baseball facility, Tomlinson Stadium, enjoyed improvements including a batter's eye, new fencing, outdoor batting cages and a new entrance way into the stadium.

Basketball – Men's

- ★First-ever NCAA tournament appearance in 1999.

- ★Sun Belt Conference Tournament champions in 1999 and Sun Belt Conference co-champions in 1998.

Basketball – Women's

- ★Ranked in Associated Press Top 25 for 1999.
- ★Participated in the women's NIT six times, winning in 1993.

Bowling

- ★ASU added bowling in November 2003 as the number nine sport for women's intercollegiate athletics. Chris James of Jonesboro was named as the sport's first head coach. The Lady Indian bowling team will begin competition in 2004.

Golf- Men's & Women's

- ★Scott Crisco was named Academic All-America in 2003.
- ★Men's golf had an individual participant in the NCAA Regional in 1998 and 1999.
- ★Entire men's golf team participated in the NCAA Regional in 2000, 2001, and 2002.
- ★Women's golf squad has placed individuals on the Sun Belt Conference all-league teams the last four seasons.
- ★Women's golf team won a Sun Belt Conference Championship in 2000.
- ★Women's golf had its first individual participant in history to compete in the women's golf NCAA Tournament.
- ★ASU hired Chris Adams in the spring of 2002 to take over the women's golf program.

Soccer – Women's

- ★A new era in women's athletics began in August of 2000 when ASU began competition in women's soccer.
- ★Soccer competed in 2001 in a brand new facility.
- ★The young sport is in its' fourth season of competition. New head coach Jason Wharton took over the program in January 2004.

Tennis – Women's

- ★Team, doubles, and individuals have ranked regionally and nationally in the last five seasons.
- ★Team selected to Intercollegiate Tennis Association All-Academic Team in 2001 (team must have cumulative grade point average of 3.2 or above).

Track/Cross Country – Men's & Women's

- ★ASU will compete in a new facility beginning in 2004. The new complex is located on Caraway Road at the south entry into campus. It contains an eight-lane, 400-meter Mondo sur-

face track. There are two long jump and two triple jump pits, two pole vault pits, two shot put and discus areas, a hammer area, two javelin areas and a steeplechase pit. In addition, there is a press box with 14 work stations. The \$2.3 million facility also houses men's and women's locker rooms, training room, office space for the head coach and assistant coaches and restrooms. Seating capacity is for 500.

- ★Men's outdoor conference championship in 1999.
- ★Women's outdoor conference champions in 2001.
- ★Historically have won a total of 14 women's and 13 men's conference championships, indoor and outdoor.
- ★Produced six Olympians in the last decade, Al Joyner, Earl Bell, Patterson Johnson, Jeff Hartwig, Chat Harting, and Kellie Suttle. ASU has produced nine Olympians overall, one world record holder, and four American record holders.

Volleyball – Women's

- ★Conference champions seven of the last ten years.
- ★Four time NCAA participant and two time NIVC participant.
- ★A winning percentage of 80% in the 1990's.

ASU Employees are assigned to a primary occupational activity category according to the following EEOC* definitions:

Faculty - All persons whose specific assignments customarily are made for the purpose of conducting instruction, research, or public service as a principal activity and who hold academic rank titles of professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, or any equivalent.

Executive/Administrative/Managerial - All persons whose assignments require primary (and major) responsibility for management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution, department, or subdivision, etc. Assignments in this category customarily and regularly require the incumbent to exercise discretion and independent judgement and to direct the work of others.

Professional/Non-Faculty - All persons employed for the primary purpose of performing academic support, student service, and institutional support activities, whose assignments would require either college graduation or experience of such kind and amount as to provide a comparable background.

Technical/Paraprofessional - All persons whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience or academic work, such as offered in many 2-year technical institutes, junior colleges, or through equivalent on-the-job training.

Clerical/Secretarial - All persons whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities or are specifically of a secretarial nature.

Skilled Craft - All persons whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work, acquired through on-the-job training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training programs.

Service/Maintenance - All persons whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties which result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience, and hygiene of personnel and the student body or which contribute to the upkeep and care of buildings, facilities, or grounds of the institutional property.

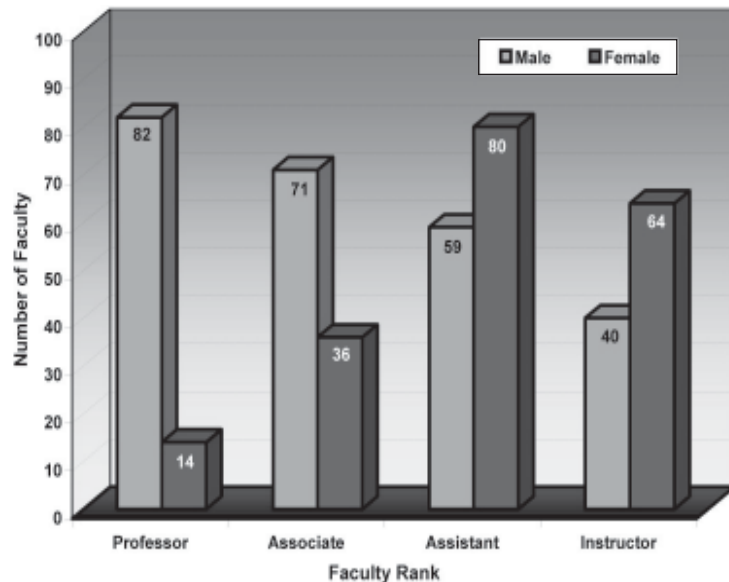

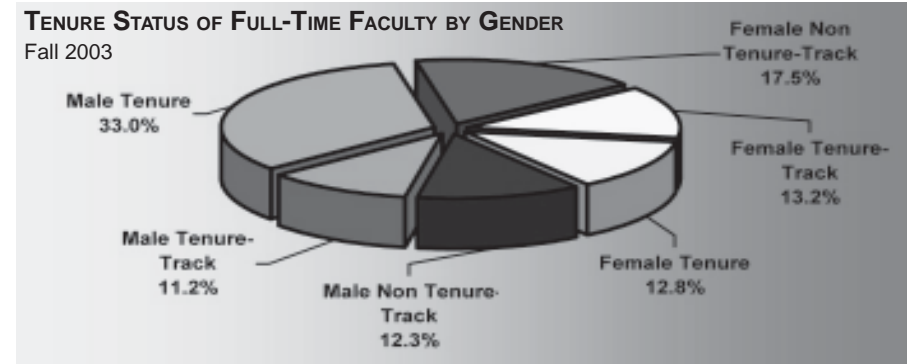
FULL-TIME FACULTY BY RANK & GENDER Fall 2003

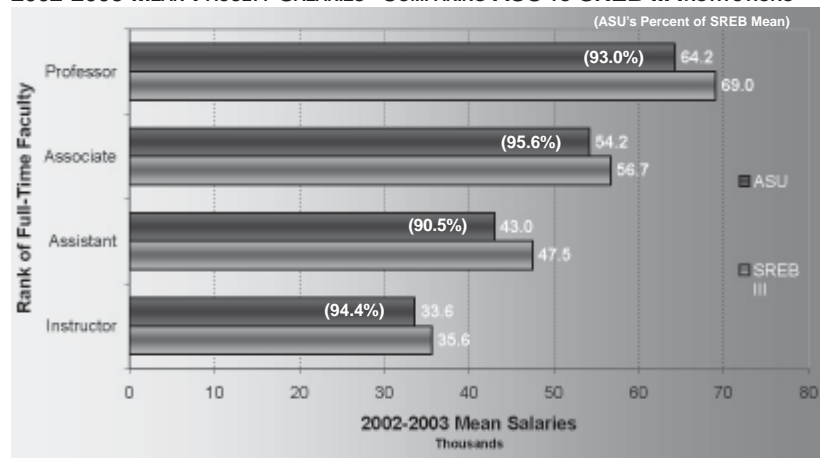

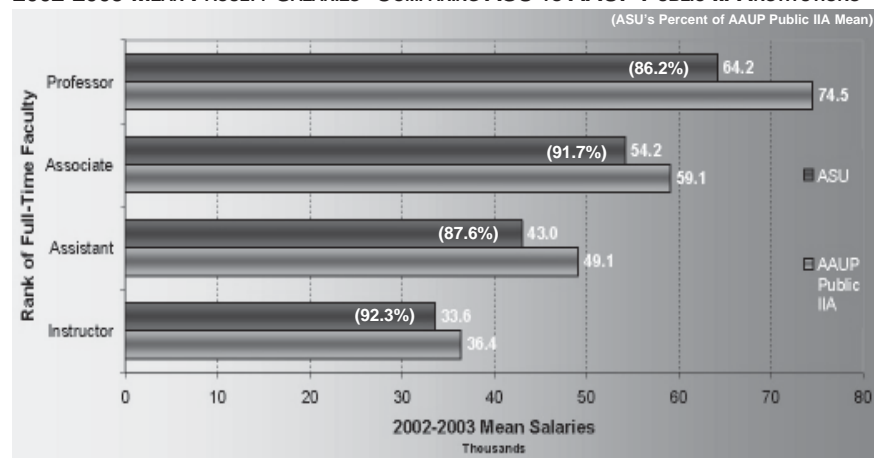

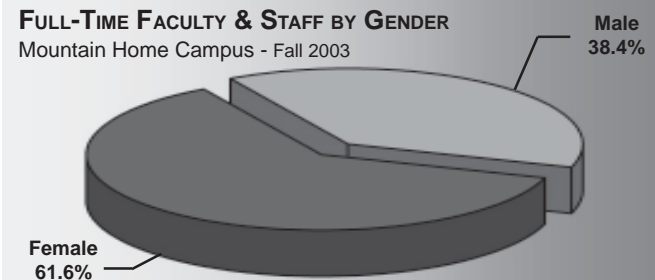
FULL-TIME FACULTY & STAFF BY GENDER

Beebe Campus - Fall 2003



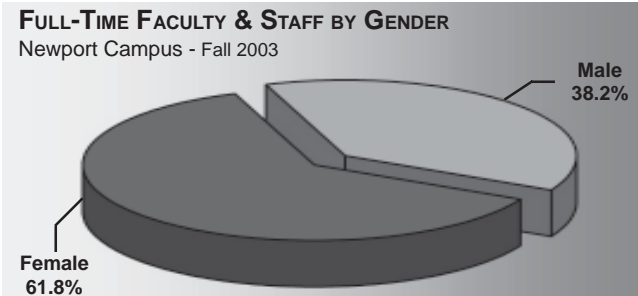
FULL-TIME FACULTY & STAFF BY GENDER

The Dean B. Ellis Library, centrally located in an eight-story building, functions as an educational center for the community. The Library of Congress classification system is used for the arrangement of books, and an on-line catalog provides access to the book collection. The library meets the informational needs of the university by offering a variety of services. A staff of 14 professional librarians and 23 support personnel acquires, organizes, and services the collection. Reference librarians assist users in locating information and in the use of the library. The reference staff also offers an active library instruction program which reaches numerous university classes. The library provides access to hundreds of online databases and search services via links on the library's web site. Materials that are not contained in the library's collection are accessible by interlibrary loan through the OCLC network.

Meal plans are mandatory for all residence hall students and may only be changed prior to the end of the first week of the semester. On the 10, 15, and 19 meal plans, meals do not carry over from week to week. The Flex meal plan consists of 100 meals and an allotment of \$200 in declining balance points. The declining balance points may be used in the Woodlands Cafeteria, the Wigwam, or the Twin Towers Store. The Flex plan permits the student owner of the plan to use it to pay for meals of others or to reenter the cafeteria multiple times during a meal period. Both the block of 100 meals and the \$200 in declining balance points must be used before the end of any given semester.

System Financial Aid

By Fiscal Year

Financial aid is available to Arkansas State University students from a variety of sources. Not only can students obtain federal aid, state aid, and privately funded scholarships, but Arkansas State University also offers several types of institutional scholarship packages to qualifying Arkansas residents. The scholarships are primarily awarded based on ACT scores, GPA's, and/or academic achievement. Institutional scholarships available include the following: Academic Merit Award, Beyond Boundaries Scholarship, Chancellor's Scholarship, Dean's Scholarship, Future Delta Leaders Service Scholarship, Transfer Scholarship and University Honors Scholarship.

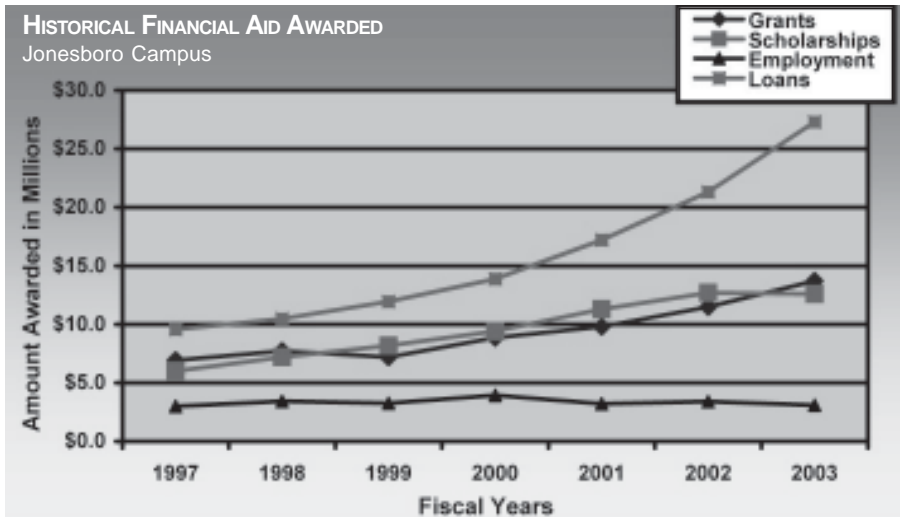

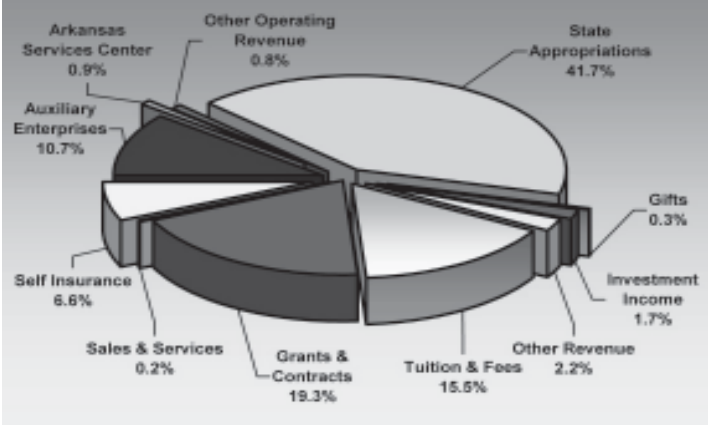

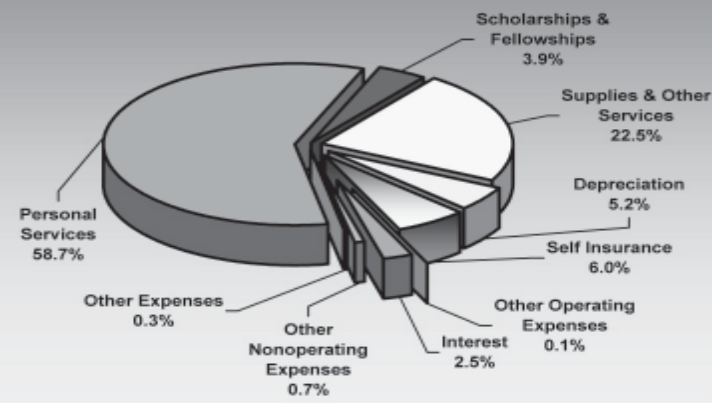

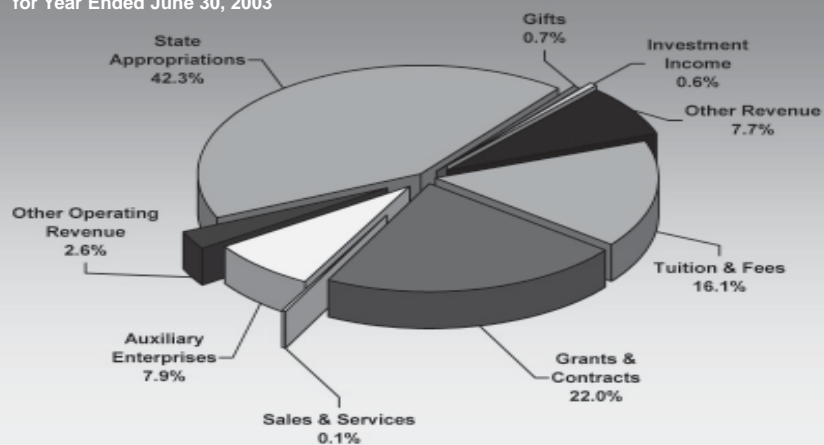

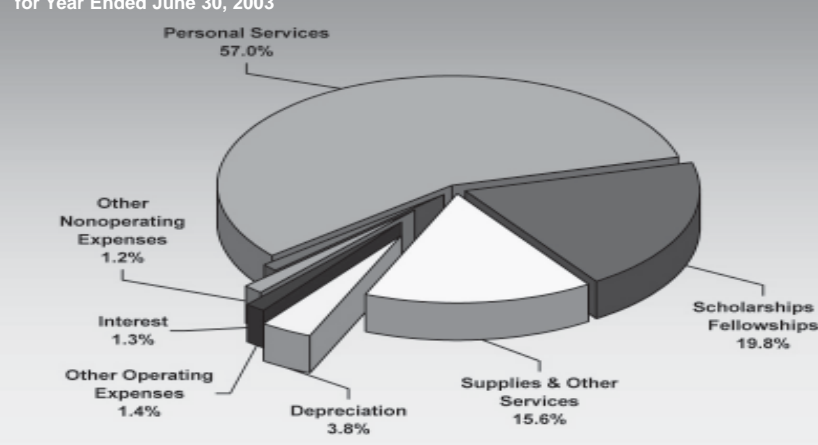

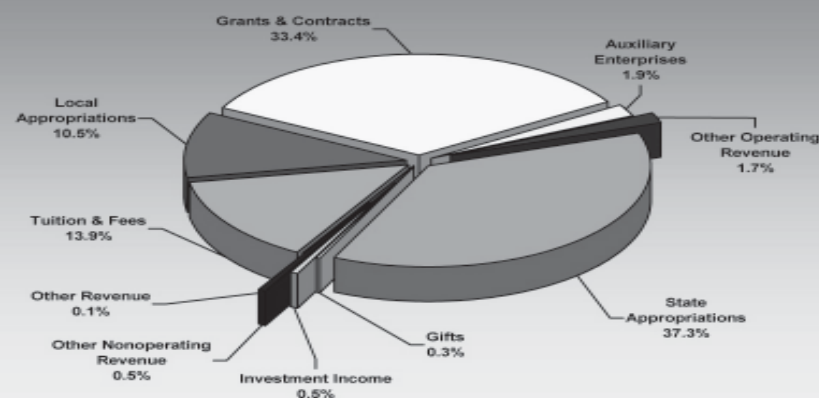

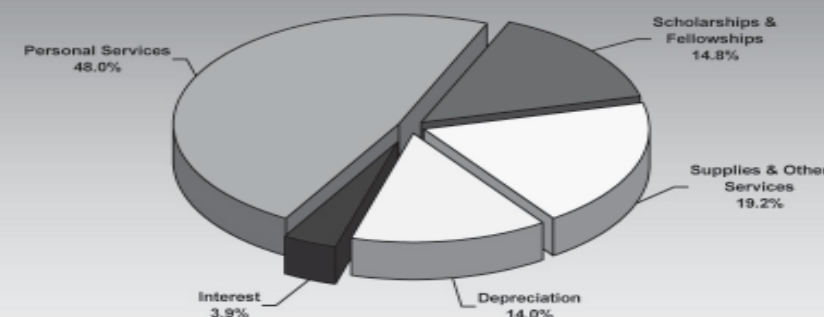

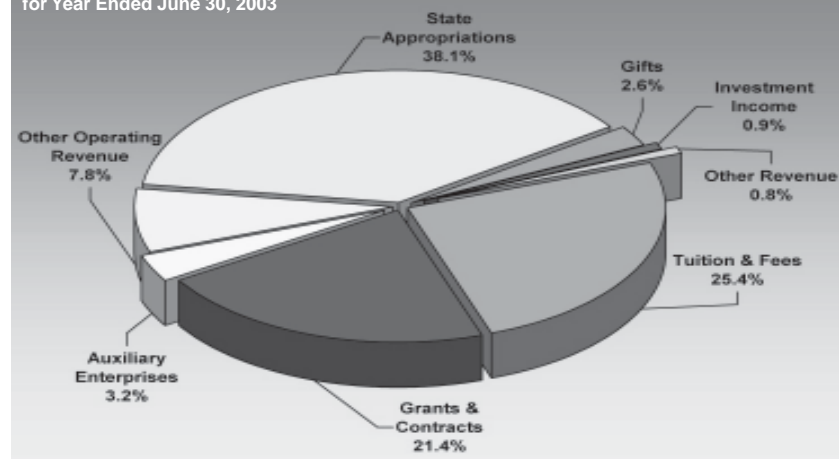

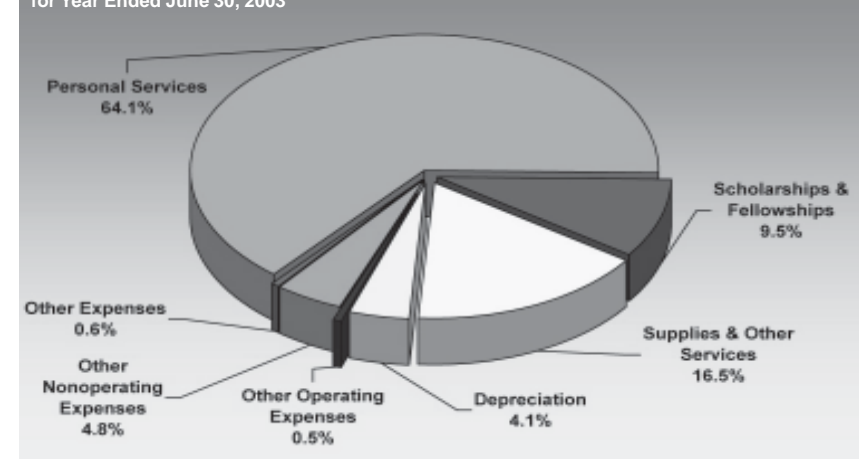

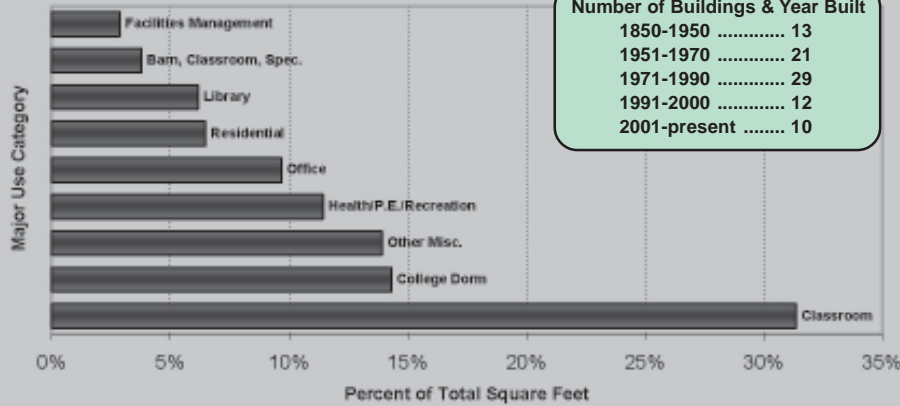
Jonesboro Campus - Fiscal Year 2003

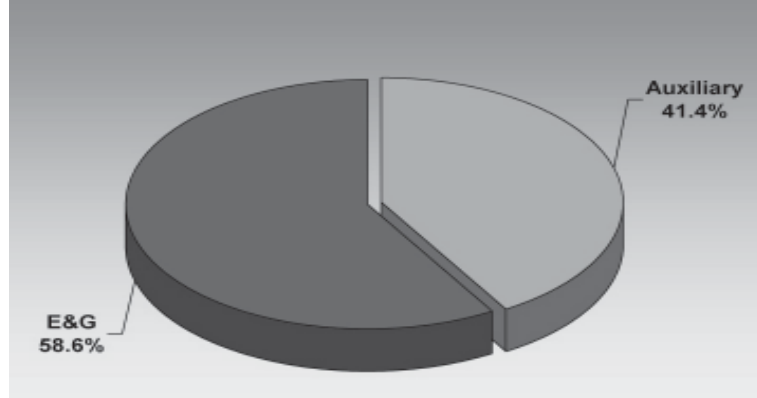
